

### A Visual Story for Family Day visits




The Science Oxford Centre is in Headington, Oxford.



If I live nearby, I can walk there...



...or I can travel by bicycle





If I do not live nearby, I can travel by car and park nearby or outside the Centre



I can take the bus too, but I will have to walk a little while to get there afterwards.



This is the entrance on Quarry Road.

We will be careful on the road. There could be cars coming the other way.



We must stay close to the left side of the road.

There might be leaves and mud on the ground. They can be slippery to walk on.

There are speed bumps in the road. We will drive or cycle slowly over them.



There are houses at the bottom of the hill.

We will turn right and follow the arrow up the hill.

The hill is a bit steep to walk up.



This is the entrance to the car park.

There is a red and white barrier at the top of the hill.

On weekends, the barrier will be open for us.

On weekdays, we may need to speak to someone at reception, using the red intercom box on the right.





There are disabled car parking spaces if we need them.

We can park our bicycles here too.



We might see this gate in the Car Park.

This woodland entrance might be locked, because it is only used by school groups.

To visit the woodland, we should first checkin at reception. The staff inside will show us which way to go.



This is the entrance to the building.

The Ohm statue is outside.

The Science Oxford Centre is inside.



Before we go inside, we should clean our hands with hand sanitiser.


Hand sanitiser feels cold and wet, and sometimes smells like chemicals.

If the door is closed, we can push the button to open it.





#### This is the lobby and check-in desk.

## Someone from Science Oxford will meet us here.



We can eat and drink here.





Staff will be wearing a Science Oxford top – it might be **blue**, green, pink or **black**.

They may also be wearing a visor or a face mask, to keep everyone safe.

We will check-in by telling them our name.

This is the way to the Science Oxford Centre.

The Exploration Zone is through the green doors. The doors will be open when it is time to go in.We must only enter the Exploration Zone during the session we have booked.

In this corridor, there are toilets, lockers and a water fountain to use before we go into the Exploration Zone.





All of the toilets are gender-neutral. We can use any of them.

The hand-driers are quite loud and noisy. They turn on automatically, but we can ask the staff to turn them off for us.

There is a disabled access toilet and a baby-changing room too.

#### This is the Exploration Zone.

#### We can play with and explore all the exhibits in this room.



When we visit, the exhibits might be in a different order to the picture. In here, we should not run or shout, and we must not eat or drink.



There are lots of different exhibits to explore.

This one can be quite noisy and it might blow air at us. Some of the scarves and balls could be on the floor.

We might share this exhibit with other people whilst we play.



This one is also noisy and blows air when we press the button on the hand drier.


We can feel the difference between the two metal hand shapes too.



At this one, we can play on our own, or with somebody else on the other side.

All of the objects look and feel different.

They are fun to touch.



There are two toilets in the Exploration Zone.

They have green doors.

This is the way to the exit and outdoor area too.



When we are outside, we can sit at the tables under the canopy.

#### We can eat or have a drink here.

There might be blue coat racks to put our belongings on too.



During the Winter, this area has extra walls to keep us warm and dry.

We can still eat outside and use the toilets here, we just might want to keep our coat on too!

There are doors in the grey walls, so we can still visit the woodland and ponds.





Outside, there are three toilets, a water fountain, rubbish bins and hand-washing sinks.

One of the toilets has full disabled access and washing facilities.




When we are outside, we might experiment at the Water Lab.

#### It is only open between March-October.

## We might need to share the equipment with other people.

We could get wet, so we should bring a change of clothes, just in case.



To visit the ponds, we can follow this path.

Wheelchairs and pushchairs can follow this path.




There are bridges, piers and walkways that go over the pond.

We can walk on them.

We can listen and look for wildlife in or near the water.

We should not put anything in the pond, because it could harm the wildlife.



To visit the woods, we can follow this path.

Wheelchairs and pushchairs can follow this path.

The path is made from rocks, and it is a bit uneven.



#### SEE THE WORLD DIFFERENTLY EXPLORE DISCOVER PLAY



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We can follow the woodland trails.

We can take a printed map with us, or look at the sign at the start of the woods.



There are three trails: pink, green and blue.

# We can follow the coloured arrows along the way.





The rocky path ends at the Viewing Point and Amphitheatre.

Wheelchairs and push-chairs cannot go further than this.

To walk the trails, we can follow the arrows and turn left.





We can see the ponds from the Viewing Point. We might see or hear

wildlife here.

We can sit down at the Amphitheatre.

We can eat or drink here, but we must take our rubbish with us.



As we walk along the trails, we might find steps and bridges.

We can hold on to the wooden rails if we need.










The woodland trails might be grassy or muddy or covered with leaves and sticks.

If it is wet and rainy, we should bring wellies or walking shoes.

If we find animals or insects, we must be kind and leave them in the woods.



## When it is time to go, we can leave using this gate.

## If it is closed, we need to press the green 'exit' button to open it.

We can wash our hands or use hand sanitiser on the way out.



If there is an emergency, we may need to evacuate the Science Oxford Centre.

If an alarm sounds, we will calmly follow a staff member wearing a high visibility jacket and exit the building.

The Assembly Point is in the car park near the woodland gateway that says "Explore Discover Play"
